- Provide youthful detainees with a creative, unique, and rewarding literacy development project - writing, illustrating, and publishing five children's picture books
- Provide Juvenile Justice Center teachers with professional support

Persons Served

- Incarcerated youth at charter school located in the Juvenile Probation Department

Project Activities

- Juvenile Justice Center (JJC) students, working under the guidance of UHD pre-service teachers, write drafts for five children's picture books.
- Pre-service teachers provide JJC students with editing feedback and writing instruction at the point of need.
- JJC students, writing under pseudonyms, add biographies to the book drafts.
- Submit the five illustrated children's book drafts to Author House, a self-publishing book company.

Project Administration

- Obtain permission from JJC charter school principal to conduct project.
- Obtain permission from university administration to take students to JJC.
- Pre-service teachers and university faculty arrange date and time with JJC administrative staff to obtain pre-criminal background check clearances.
- Pre-service teachers and university faculty obtain administrative permission from university for fieldtrip to JJC.

Project Administration

- Collect signed fieldtrip waivers from UHD students.
- Train pre-service teachers in teaching at-risk youth, writing instruction methodology and children's picture book publishing protocol.
- Conduct field trip orientation tour of JJC.
- JJC staff visit university to orientate pre-service teachers in working with JJC students.
- Pre-service teachers, under the guidance of university professors and JJC teachers, visit JJC to complete drafts of children's books with JJC students.

Project Administration

- Provide copies of the published children's picture books to JJC students, teachers, and administrators.
- Provide report and copies of published children's picture books to the grant provider, State Representative Sylvester Turner, and the university Office of Global

Citizenship.

Research Questions

- How did the literacy project influence students' attitudes and perspectives towards the culture of special populations?
- What impact did service-learning have on the preservice teachers' knowledge and understanding of individuals within special populations?
- What did the literacy project reveal to the pre-service teachers about the literacy development of the incarcerated youth?

Methodology

• Using an emergent coding method (Merriam, 1998), the authors sought to establish a triangulation of the findings across multiple transcripts. Results indicated students' attitudes, perspectives, and knowledge of special populations and literacy development broadened as a result of the project.
